# It Ain't Nothin' but a Thang!

If you're a fan, and old enough, you would recall the Rocky and Bullwinkle show where Mr. Peabody would tell his boy Sherman to set the "WayBack" machine for a certain date and they would travel to a specific date to learn and perhaps help give history a boost. Today Mr. Peabody asks us to turn the WayBack machine to the time of Exodus 4 where Moses is in the process of being called to serve by a Burning Bush.

Now the interesting thing about this process, in fact the entire scripture, is that God always does something with nothing and makes creation and redemption happen. In faith we speak of God creating *ex nihlo* – "out of nothing" as in the beginning God spoke and creation began to be formed. God doesn't take what is there and create and this is why CS Lewis in <u>Mere Christianity</u> points out that, "this is what makes Him God. He's not using stuff that is already created but creates from nothing." Hence, He is the Creator and everything else, including you and I, are creatures or created things and therefore subservient to the Creator.

So back to the bush. God calls a worn out, sheep farming, former important ruler of Egypt, who happens to be a murder and escaped convict, and is preparing to send him back to Egypt to be the one to lead God's people into freedom from slavery. Oh, by the way Moses is the master of the "but God" as he keeps coming up with excuse after excuse as to why he can't do what God is calling him to do. And here is problem 1. It's not about Moses, it's not about you or me. If you got the idea that God can't use you, or that you are some super-special person making it happen, both answers are dangerously and unfaithfully wrong! It is, has been and always will be about Jesus – ALONE. *Sola Cristo*.

But to make the point here that Mr. Peabody has brought us to see, I wanna talk about the stick. There's Moses, just starting his excuse line-up, and God looks at him and says, "What's that in your hand?" Now looking at all this from our perspective you can see how hilarious this conversation is between God and Moses. Here is the God of all creation looking at looser Moses and he says what? "What's that in your hand?" Moses – "Ahh, a stick?!." (Code for nothing, just like me) God, looking at the reader and breaking the 4<sup>th</sup> wall [implied] "Duh, I'm God and know what it is, I made it." So He gives Moses a simple word, a command, God's will as God says, "Throw it on the ground." Moses complies and lo and behold God's word, command has created something from nothing as it is now a snake. WHAT?!?

What does Moses do in response to God's word and power, he runs the other direction. So, God, speaks again, "Reach your hand out and pick it upby the tail." Another command, God's word, and again Moses wisely listens and picks it up, the stick that is, because God's word has made it to do what He intends it to do. And here is the point, God directly tells Moses why He has done this – so that "they," the people Moses doesn't think will believe him, who certainly should not believe in Moses but the God of all creation who sent Him and so they can see that God is even using Moses to work His will in creation.

That is the best part. It's not about you, me, or Moses. It's about God, and God revealed in Jesus. The beauty of what God does it that He takes simple elements of this world, that have no power or value, and He joins them to His word, command, will and they become something more. That simple stick is used by God, through Moses' listening to His word throughout the entire journey to the promised land. God uses that stick, joined to His word, later to turn all the water in Egypt to blood, to part the Red Sea so His people could cross to safety through His mercy, and He uses it to bring water from a rock in the wilderness so the people can drink.

God likes to work, over and over through scripture and still today, joining His powerful word to simple elements ...continued on next page





of creation to do miraculous things. God takes wood, water, the sacrifice of animals, bread and wine all joined to the strong word of God, to work miraculous things for His people. Even as March begins, God leads us into this month using ashes attached to His word to do the same. Simple elements with that

strong word of God that works repentance and new life in God's people who listen to Him.

It never is about us only God, yet we get easily lost along the way, taking credit for doing well, being faithful, and so many other ways we, by our very nature, turn things around so that we have a hand in this salvation gig. And yet even ashes are used by God to help us to recall, "We are dust, and to dust we will return." But at the right time, God uses another stick, the wood of the cross in an even more brilliant way, as His own Son is nailed to simple wood, to die in our stead, to receive the full burden of punishment that we deserve, and to die the death we are meant to die - forever separated from God. And from His obedience and doing what we sinners can't, God uses another simple earthly element the grave attached to His strong word, to call what is dead and sacrificed from that tomb. To call what has paid the price and redeemed all of creation back to God, His beloved Son, as His strong word declares, "It is finished, COME OUT!" And so He will do for the faithful whose trust lies not in themselves, but in Him and His word, they will come out too.

The people and things of the Bible are not Extraordinary - by no means. They are all creatures and creation of a fallen creation that cannot redeem themselves. But like Moses, Abraham, Rahab, Esther, Peter, James and John and Paul, and you and me; like wood and water, bread and wine he takes what is nothin' but a thang, He takes what is ORDINARY and He alone makes it EXTRAORDINAY. Because of a simple stick joined to His strong word.

St. Paul in Romans 10: 17 clearly says that "faith comes from hearing," but the Gospel is also communicated through the physical elements and senses of sight, smell, touch, and taste. In Matthew 13:52 Jesus mentions that a good teacher not only brings out new treasures but reminds people of old and rich treasures as well. So, each Service in Lent, we will take a journey to concretely see, smell, touch, and taste a number of biblical elements. Our Lenten theme - Promised Treasures will help us do that, just as Israel wandered through the wilderness under Moses for forty years, awaiting the Promised Land, we await heaven in the wilderness of this life. # GIVING AS AN ACT OF WORSHIP

**SICWAIUSIIIP** Malachi 3:10 - Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. And thereby put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you a blessing until there is no more need.

Mark 12:42-44 - And a poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which make a penny. And he called his disciples to him and said to them, "Truly, I say to you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the offering box. For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

**1** Corinthians 16:1-2 (RSV) - Now concerning the contribution for the saints: as I directed the churches of Galatia, so you also are to do. On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper, so that contributions need not be made when I come.

What is worship? Many books have been written about it, so how can we hope to cover it adequately here? A simple definition of worship could be "the act of adoring God." Going beyond a definition, descriptions of worship could go on and on. We can label it liturgical, contemporary, and so on, but form is not the essence of worship. If one form helps you to express your adoration for God better than another, then that style of worship is right for you. There is no right or wrong way to adore God.

Maybe a good question to ask is, "When we leave worship, do we feel uplifted? Do we feel like we've been in the presence of the Lord?" I once had a member named Ed leave church one Sunday with a scowl on his face. He confronted me, saying, "Preacher, I've got a bone to pick with you. You haven't stepped on my toes in six weeks." Ed's idea of worship was to leave the service feeling guilty. Isn't that sad?

Wouldn't it be wonderful if he left worship with a sense of exultation at having been in the presence of our Holy God? Wouldn't it be great for him to feel a sense of forgiveness? Wouldn't it be great for him to leave thinking, "I adore God more than ever and am so grateful for the salvation our Lord has brought to us"?

Have you ever stopped to look at what our Lutheran liturgy does? We often begin our worship with a brief order of confession and forgiveness. Then we may progress to singing a hymn of praise. All this is to draw us closer to our Lord and prepare our hearts for what's next — the opportunity to receive his Word. Indeed, what we may think of as worship preliminaries — these are all about preparing our hearts to receive and take heart in the reading of God's Word. Following the reading may come the preaching of the Word. After being touched by the preaching of God's Word, in whatever form it takes, and in response to all that's gone before, we make confession of our faith in the words of a creed.

To this point, the liturgy has been confessing and hearing from God. Following the creed is our first really overt act: the offering. Giving is our act of worship that responds to all that has gone before it. Then come the prayers and, finally, the Holy Sacrament.

Whether your worship follows this more traditional style or is a more contemporary approach, the fluidity of the service is all about preparing our hearts and hearing God's voice. Giving in worship is an act acknowledging all that God is doing in our hearts and lives. Giving is always a love response — not to the sermon, but to the Gospel. We give because we love Jesus. We give generously and sacrificially because we want to show our love (agape) for our Lord.

Dr. Mark Allan Powell, in his 2006 book <u>Giving to God</u>, addresses giving as an act of worship in his first chapter. He notes that in the Old Testament, people brought their sacrificial offerings to the altar and laid them there. He writes: "The offering is an act of worship, an instance in which we are invited to give up something that we value — our money — as a sacrifice to God. In many ways it is the high point of the liturgy. We come to church to worship God and at no other point in the service are we provided with so pure an opportunity for worship as this" (p. 11). He continues: "On a simple, practical level, I find it easier to sing hymns and not really mean them than it is to part with my money and not really mean it" (p. 12).

St. Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 16:2, "On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper, so that contributions need not be made when I come." In this single verse we can glean that:

- Giving is an act of worship Sunday worship had already begun.
- Giving is systematic we give whenever we worship.
- Giving is proportionate to income we give as we have prospered.
- Giving is planned in advance so contributions need not be made at the last minute.

God wants all of us — our whole being. God wants our hearts. We give not because our church needs the money but because giving is an intrinsic need. Giving expresses, or demonstrates, our love for God. It acknowledges that we love Jesus: "I need to give." We all need to give. It's part and parcel of Whose we are.

We give generously and sacrificially not because God needs it or even because the church needs it, but because we want to show our love for Him. I once heard about a pastor in Philadelphia that noted the offerings had fallen short of the congregation's needs. On receiving the offering plates from the ushers, he rather audaciously turned, faced the altar and prayed, "Well, God, this is what we think of you." What a wake-up call! Worship giving, first-fruit giving, is not designated. You don't control it. You don't direct it. You don't tell God

Worship giving, first-fruit giving, is not designated. You don't control it. You don't direct it. You don't tell God what to do with it. You give. The early Hebrews put their sacrificial gifts on the altar, and in some cases, set them on fire. They would never have presumed to tell God what to do with the gifts they gave. Worship giving is both duty (obedience and obligation) and delight (joy). Joyful giving of our time, talents and treasure to God is then an expression of our love for our Lord.

Engage 1. How have you experienced giving as an act of worship? Do you think of your offering as *a "love offering"*?

2. How have you experienced giving as an expression of love in your own life as either the giver or the receiver of gifts?

- 3. What is the purpose of worship for you? Is the concept of "adoring" God new to you? What other emotions do you feel?
- 4. Do you feel obligated to give as a duty? To whom do you feel your giving is a duty? To your church? To God?
- 5. When is it appropriate to designate one's gift, and when is it inappropriate? Discuss for a few moments.

**Prayer** - Holy Lord God, help us to grow in both our sense of duty and of delight as we make our offerings. Help us realize that, while there are many motives for giving, our primary motive must be a love response. Even as the disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray, so now we ask you to teach us to give. Grant us a new lesson on giving every week as we make our offering to you. We ask this, O God, through our Savior and Lord, Jesus the Christ. Amen.
