Empty Means EMPTY!

Out the front window of the parsonage we last lived in was the "Lutheran Cemetery." It was the length of two full blocks and width of one and one-half. Every year, especially at Easter time, but also Memorial Day and other such holidays, but especially at Easter we would watch out the window as streams of people came to visit, place flowers or such; but all I could think of was the angelic messenger's words as he spoke to early morning women and confused disciples saying, "Why do you seek the living among the dead?" I say this in with no disrespect or judgement, but those words rang clearly in my head each time.


So, before you misunderstand me, my mother and father are buried in Cincinnati, Ohio. Mom died over twenty years ago, my dad about six years ago. When mom died, I went back to visit once, but found myself saying the same thing, "Why am I looking for the living among the dead?" After that it was only my dad's burial that brought me back; and in tears and loss I released my dad, remembered mom, and when I left knowing that I would not stop again, put my hand on the place that was now filled with the perishable bodies of my mom and dad in the mausoleum, and said, "I'll see you again." That was it. Each of us grieves differently. But that angelic statement is never changing.

In this Eastertide season, one must ask why do we seek so much death? Why do we find ourselves almost drawn to it and to places where death is overwhelming? Or, in the opposite direction, we seem to run from it in denial thinking that we can somehow delay death through health regiments, medical procedures, covering it up with surgery, dyes in our beards, or changing its name. Even in the Church after a death has occurred in the body many seek to call it a celebration of life rather than burial of the dead, somehow missing the keen importance of facing Death head on, with no blinders. Why do we need to face Death this way, call it by its proper name Death? Because it is inevitable. Paul squarely reminds us in **Romans 6:23**, "for the wages of sin IS DEATH." There just isn't any wiggle room. Even if I try to deny and "sin" in my life, I still know that I am a fragile, finite creature and from the minute I am born I am moving toward death. In the movie with the same name, we are all on death row, moving through our days we are, "Dead Men [and Women] Walking."

But here is where we, as people who have been washed, redeemed, adopted, and inherited into the family of God have a hand up – quite literally. The angelic question states an eternal profession of truth – Empty means EMPTY. This Good News affects not just this moment of our life, but it should have bearing on every moment of every day. We do have a hand up, in fact two. Pierced hands of our Lord that still bear the marks of our sin and the cost it carries, and two feet, marked as well; together that move, lead, carry, and hold us in each day. So not only do we find an empty tomb where Christ has left behind all of our sin that he bore in His body on the cross, but we find life through death, despite death, crushing death. "I will not die but live, and will proclaim what the LORD has done," writes the psalmist in 118:17.

The emptiness of that tomb, now flooded with fresh air and light from the sun, calls me to ask the question for myself - Why do I look for the living among the dead? What makes me keep going back to ways, actions, and thoughts that I want Christ to bury? How is it that I keep digging up, as wisdom from my past, what I am not able to do or how far my actions can't reach for Him as they halt me from "proclaiming what the LORD has done," even in a mess like me? What power of death constantly holds before my eyes the failings and atrocities that I have committed upon creation, others, God's love, and even myself that make me, with so many in scripture, say, "it would have been better that I was never born?" How is the fear of death making me clutch and tight fistedly hold on and minimally share the blessings of my life, myself, and my talents towards others flowing from God's hands?

The angelic question turned profession then helps me to sort out this mess by declaring the truth of this world and my condition against the backdrop of Jesus' own death and resurrection. I need to call death, Death. Whether it is the end of a life,

failing of life, the weakness, brutality, stubbornness, carelessness, or selfishness of my living as a "Dead Man walking," because I am dust and to dust I will return, I need to give it is proper due to keep me seeing the spaciousness of that empty tomb. Ezekiel proclaimed God's command to prophetically tell dusty, dry bones that the Lord was going to make them live, and so they did. (*Ezekiel 37: 1-14*) The Gospels all record that when the world, including you and I, were at our worst - even more than all the worsts we recall and imagine from our life, as we rejected, abandoned, betrayed, and killed the God of our creation who has always been for us; God's answer was to let death kill itself. You heard me – at the crucifixion in our worst, when we wanted and asked for the removal of Christ Jesus from hindering us in our way, God let the act of dying kill Death and it's hold on us, forever.

God has always looked on His beloved creation, from the moment of the fall, and saw Dead Men walking right into a tomb to be sealed forever behind us. But with no hesitation, God saw and declared that we would be Live Men walking, because He already saw that that tomb was empty and was going to be forever for those who hold on to Jesus; those who come looking in death for one that is forever alive. So I have to keep asking the question of myself, "Why am I seeking the living me amidst a dying world" as every death tries to step up and convince me this is what I am? I ask, so I can take that death, excuse, choice, failure, and flaw and put them in that tomb so Jesus can seal it up forever. Because – empty means empty, whether it is where my beloved rests waiting for the coming again of Christ, or in the death that tries to overcome and stifle in me the creation God has made to serve Him and all the world. And if I do go looking still for the living among the dead, when I look at it squarely and honestly, I can trust and see it is a lie that bears no power. Jesus Christ is Risen. Risen Indeed! Alleluia. Pastor Matt

NURTURING GENEROSITY

1 Thessalonians 5:12-28

We ask you, brothers, to respect those who labor among you and are over you in the Lord and admonish

you, and to esteem them very highly in love because of their work. Be at peace among yourselves. And we urge you, brothers, admonish the idle, encourage the fainthearted, help the weak, be patient with them all. See that no one repays anyone evil for evil, but always seek to do good to one another and to everyone. Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophecies, but test everything; hold fast what is good. Abstain from every form of evil. Now may the God of peace himself sanctify you completely and may your whole spirit and soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. He who calls you is faithful; he will surely do it. Brothers, pray for us. Greet all the brothers with a holy kiss. I put you under oath before the Lord to have this letter read to all the brothers. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

Hebrews 10:23-25

Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near.

My husband, Luke, has a gift for gift giving. I can't send the man to the grocery store without him coming home with a bouquet of flowers. He's spent a tremendous amount of time figuring out my taste in just about everything. Whether it be food, candy, art, or jewelry, he tends to know exactly what I'll love. My appreciation for his generosity and consideration truly knows no bounds, but throughout our relationship, we've run into a bit of a problem. I'm grateful for gifts, and I know that they are undoubtedly signs of his love, but when I think about love, I don't think of wrapping paper or fresh cut flowers. I think about words. More than anything, I need profession and affirmation. I need proclamations. "Yes! I love you!" and "Of course! I'm proud of you!" and "Absolutely! I enjoyed spending time with you!" and so on. You get the idea.

You can see where the conflict may pop up. For all that I desired words, I was too worried about sounding ungrateful to express what I needed. When I finally just confessed that I needed him to say nice things to me, he was baffled. We had a couple of conversations about it, he explained that he put much more stock in actions than in words, and I made him take the Love Languages Quiz. After we talked, he snuck in "I love you" more often in our day-to-day life, but as we continued to grow closer to one another and mature, things changed more drastically.

Along with gifts, suddenly I was getting cards with messages written inside. Some of the messages were sweet, some were silly, but all of them were full of love. He recognized what I needed, and even though it came unnaturally at first, he was bound and determined to use his gifts (*"Giving a card counts as a present," he has remarked*) to help me feel exactly how important he finds our relationship. Relationships — romantic, platonic, familial, or otherwise — are the building blocks of community, and how we cultivate healthy relationships with the people in our lives teaches us a lot about what it looks like to create healthy communities. For a marriage or friendship or even just society as a whole, to function there has to exist a willingness to give to one another. To be clear, I'm not just talking about picking up the tab for lunch or selecting the perfect box of Valentine's Day chocolates.

Just the very act of being in relationship is an act of giving. We give of ourselves. We take time to listen, to encourage, to communicate and to rejoice. Healthy relationships and communities look like the kind of community Paul describes in his letter to the Thessalonians. God created us with intentionality so that we would dwell alongside each other, not only learning from each other's gifts but also encouraging each other's gifts. We show gratitude for those who care for us, and, just as importantly, we learn how to care for our neighbors the same way. Being in relationship with one another provokes us to think about our gifts in a new light and with new creativity.

My husband never would've considered the way his gift for gift-giving could help fulfill my longing for words of affirmation, but the stack of cards he's given me has become one of my most treasured possessions. When we spend time with one another and develop empathy for one another, a desire to care and an outpouring of generosity are the natural results. But this isn't a hollow generosity; it is a generosity that considers the needs and desires of those we give to. We don't keep insisting on chocolates and flowers when our loved one needs words of comfort and reassurance. We take time to invest in our relationships and communities, so that we may be still and listen to the needs and desires of those around us.

A spirit of generosity grows from spending time with one another, sharing burdens and joys, and from a heart willing to listen to the honest needs and wants of our loved ones, communities, and our church. The necessity of relationships and the generosity that forms there is modeled for us on the very first pages of scripture, where our Lord dwells with Adam and Eve in the garden. Our God is not distant but present alongside his beloved creation. Moreover, our Lord responds with tremendous mercy and giving, clothing the naked Adam and Eve even after they have fallen into sin, recognizing their desire for dignity, even amid pain and suffering. Our Lord continues to show us the importance of relationships, taking on flesh and dwelling amongst us as the one we call Immanuel, "God with us." How could we ever seek to live separately from one another?

God himself became human and dwelled alongside his friends through weddings and fishing trips and grief-stricken funerals. Moreover, the generosity that Christ shows our community extends past turning water into wine and healing the sick — it is a generosity that is willing to give of itself so that we may see that grace is an outpouring of God's own sacrificial love. Filled with this love, and in relation with the Holy Spirit, we are freed to go into our communities, equipped with the spiritual gifts the Lord has freely given us, and think creatively, mercifully, and joyfully about how God's generosity may overflow onto all we meet. ...*continued on next page*

The February council meeting minutes were corrected. The minutes state Committee reports are due 2 weeks before the meeting. The correction should state *1 week prior to the council meeting not 2 weeks*. *Minutes were corrected and a motion was made to approve the minutes by Nicole Krohn*, seconded by Beth Buboltz, motion carried.

The treasurer's report was reviewed with no bills submitted. A motion was made to approve the report by Dale Krohn, seconded by Nicole Krohn, motion carried.

Pastor Matt shared with the council the hope for the group to spend time on visioning and goal setting. Members of the council will take time together to study the bible and discuss thoughts from the book titled *Letters to The Church. On Wednesday, April 5th the cantata will provide the lenten service at 6:30pm. Thursday, April 6th will be the Maundy church service at 6:30pm. Nicole Krohn shared the exciting news from the Toilet Paper Drive that concluded February 19th with approximately 220 rolls donated to the TLC Food Pantry. The updates to the Food Pantry needs continue to be shared in the Sunday announcements. Nicole would like to conduct a survey to gather feedback on how the church can create a welcoming environment to visitors and see where we can make improvements. The red chairs in the narthex will be relocated to the Sweet Vale of Avoca Museum. April 2nd is National PB & J Day. On Sunday, April 2nd the congregation will be invited to donate jars of peanut butter and/or jelly that will be given to the local food pantries.

For old business, Yandas came and installed the new recording box which allows the recording process to be simpler. With this new recording box streaming capabilities are available if the council decides to use this feature. Other repairs completed by Yandas consisted of the motorized screen and replacing the light bulb for the projector. Nine congregational members attended the AED training. Replacement pads and a battery have been ordered to update the current pads and battery in the AED machine. Sue will be out of the office on March 23rd and March 24th. The report from the Audit Committee was shared with the council. Dale Krohn shared more information about the tuck pointing project. There will need to be a special congregational meeting to approve the tuck pointing project expenses. This special meeting will be held on March 26, 2023 after the worship service. "Lord, teach us to pray" Luke 11:1 (Part 6)

Back to our subject of prayer...... Praying for hope. Most of the ways we use the word, "hope" is all about uncertainty. "I hope I don't trip." "I hope it doesn't rain tomorrow." "I hope the stock market rectifies itself." It has no sense of confidence. But the New Testament, when it uses the word "hope," knows nothing of uncertainty. God wants us to "know what is the hope to which he has called you". To know this hope is to know the assurance of a reality that you have not yet fully experienced. It is not something that is in doubt. It is something that has been promised by the God of truth. It is a secure hope. It is a hope that breeds confidence. It is a hope based on the knowledge that "those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son", and "he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion." So, in the book of Ephesians, Paul is telling the early Christians that he is praying that they might actually know the hope to which God has called them in Christ Jesus. He doesn't simply mean only an intellectual knowledge; he means knowing both intellectually and experientially. Hope is objective. It is a reality based on truth. And also, hope is subjective. The reality is something I take hold of with my heart. Biblical hope is what enables our hearts to remain calm when we think, "one day I will pass away." Biblical hope means our hearts respond to the thoughts of our own death by saying, "Jesus is risen. My faith is there, in him. He's my hope. He will not fail me." This is probably most evident in our lives when we attend funerals, for they are moments where people come face to face with mortality – face to face with hope or hopelessness. There is a very good chance that at a funeral service you will hear the words, "Ashes to ashes, and dust to dust, in the sure and certain hope of eternal life through our Lord Jesus Christ." How does that work? How can you have a certain hope: If it's hope, it can't be sure and certain; and if its' sure and certain, it's not hope. But luckily for us, the hope that God gives is different – it is a reality that is absolutely assured but that is not yet fully experienced. It is by having a real and living relationship with our Savior Jesus Christ that get to know him and know this hope he gives us. It is sometimes best said, "No God, no hope. Know God, know hope."
