Nothing like Spring Water

*“Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks of the water that I will give him will never be thirsty again. The water that I will give will be a spring of living water welling up to eternal life.” **John 4:13 – 14***

*“Oh, taste and see that the Lord is good. Blessed is the man who takes refuge in Him!” **Psalm 34:8***

*“How sweet are Your words to my taste, sweeter than honey to my mouth!” **Psalm 119: 103***

For all those born before the 1980’s there is an interesting question to ask: ***Could you ever have imagined a world where water would have a cost and so many varieties of water could be found as today? (and, new waters come out all the time)*** The answer, most likely is, heck no. Water is water; it all comes from the same place. What could possibly make Dasani different from Walmart’s bottled water? And yet, how many people today are buying all these forms of water by the case?

I took a group of youth in Nebraska to the Boundary Waters. There we could drink right out of the lakes. The water was pristine, clear all the way to the bottom. It was an interesting experience for about 2 days, except for the affect it had on me. That water had **NOTHING** in it, and I mean, nothing. No minerals, no chlorine, no fluoride, no nothin. The affect still lingers today as if I am drinking water, 99% of the time, it is a can of some form of bubbly flavored water (*no sugar and natural flavors of course*). That water was so devoid of anything that it had the affect on me that it never quenched my thirst.

By the end of the trip, I was miserable, parched, dehydrated and when a 5-gallon cooler of ice water was made available I drank 2 liters - nonstop. (*not an exaggeration*) I had been drinking water all through the trip, paddling and fording canoes, and no matter how much I drank it was of no avail. Finally, I stopped drinking, until that cooler appeared, and I was **THIRSTY!**

I think this thirst is part of a spiritual and biblical drought going on across the Church in America. When Jesus talked with that Samaritan woman at the well, she was talking spring water like in MN, Jesus was talking living water. The water is His Word, and His Word is Him. To drink heavily and longingly should be our desire because it is this water that springs up and then flows from us as we continue to reflect, listen, and apply that word to life.

Today God’s word seems to be like bottled waters, there are a variety of words and ways to get this Word from Jesus, very few of which are Jesus’ Word. They are close, they sound like they should be His, but just like that water in the Boundary area – there is nothing to it. The effects of this water can clearly be seen, dried out people. It’s like the Valley of Bones, but people walking around today, in and out of the church are dehydrated; and if dehydrated then this water can’t flow from us so other people can have their thirsts quenched.

Today, as people try to modernize, make attractive, or refocus these words of Jesus to be softer, calmer, nice you eventually find out that you aren’t drinking from the Spring of Life. We try to draw attention to Jesus as a healer or teacher, or nice guy but none of these are the true water that is held in the rain barrel of the Bible. Even as Jesus was talking to that woman, she was thinking and talking of the “other” water. We all do it as we easily shift to something that seems to end our thirst because it is at hand, rather than make the hard choice to go deep and get that real water.

...As Jesus asked her for water, the woman said something profound, “Sir, the well is deep, and you don’t even have a bucket.” She knew you had to go deep; she was just looking at the wrong water source. The water that is Jesus is the sweetest, most fulfilling drink you can ever have. It puts out the fires of shame and guilt, and soothes the sorrows of failure and sin. This water washes over those who drink it with absolution and grace and makes them new and part of a new family as well. Even when we are parched and these words come to us and they don’t seem to satisfy in the moment, in that water is a promise from God that flows to us without limitation or cessation.

What’s more, you don’t have to do anything to get it. Jesus did the work of going down in the well, through cross and empty tomb, and now pours that water out each week with worship: forgiveness of sins, assurance of our inheritance, cooling the fires of guilt and shame. Jesus is the bucket and as we get soaked, we flow over to others so that they too can be quenched in their thirsts. Jesus points that woman, and us to the real work He has come to do, to seek and save the lost and dehydrated, to fill them up with His great and unending love, and to be a fountain that pours out till every single person is drenched with His love for them. He IS Risen!!! Allaluaia!



TIME

So, as I bring my Five and Dime career to a close in a couple more articles, one of the things I want to bring up is the Bible. In general, I used to look at it as one large book with a collection of smaller books within it. But over the years I have learned to look at it in a different light. Essentially, the Bible is a book about Jesus. In the Old Testament Jesus is predicted. In the Gospels, He is revealed. In the Book of Acts, He is preached. In the Epistles, He is explained. And in Revelation, Jesus is expected. And in keeping that in mind, I've been able to find some hidden nuggets tucked away in different areas of the Bible, which I would like to share in my closing thoughts. Since we have just passed through the Easter Season, some of those thoughts are freshest in my mind, so I will start there. In a few short months, we will be on the threshold of our Advent Season. And we will read or hear about Jesus' birth, which in the book of Luke 2:4-7 is says, "Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and family line of David, to be registered along with Mary, who was engaged to him and was pregnant. While they were there, the time came for her to give birth. Then she gave birth to her firstborn Son, and she wrapped him tightly in cloth and laid him in a manger, because there no guest room available for them." The "manger" is the focus of those verses. The definition of a manger is "a long open box or trough for horses or cattle to eat from." Now in Luke, it does not say it, but it is probably safe to assume that there had not been any other babies born and placed in that manger prior to Jesus. So, it was a place that no other body, or human had ever been placed before. Now, jumping ahead 33 years, we also read in Luke 23:50-53 "There was a good and righteous man named Joseph, a member of the Sanhedrin, who had not agreed with their plan and action. He was from Arimathea, a Judean town, and was looking forward to the kingdom of God. He approached Pilate and asked for Jesus's body. Taking it down, he wrapped it in fine linen and placed it in a tomb cut into the rock, where no one had ever been placed." So, we see, just a Jesus's life had begun being laid in a place that no one had ever been laid before, his earthly life also ended the exact same way, laid in a place that no one had ever been laid before.

Approval of Agenda: A motion was made by Amber Johnson, seconded by Eric Sieh. Motion passed.

Approval of Last Meeting Minutes: A motion was made to approve the minutes by Darian Irlbeck, seconded by Eric Sieh. With amendments noted. Motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: Report and bills were submitted. A motion was made to approve the report by Ryan Winter, seconded by Darian Irlbeck. Motion passed.

Pastor's Report: Grace and peace. February was a busy month in many ways, but it seemed as if I was getting nowhere. The last several weeks without a vehicle have slowed down and challenged my ability to get out as I would like but now that seems to be rectified. We have begun Lent and with it extra worship services. Hopefully, Wednesday evening worship and soup suppers will draw people to come and be with us as it is billed as an ecumenical worship. All offerings from these soup suppers will be split between the Avoca and Walnut food pantries. Thank you to Eric Sieh who has done a lot of extra work helping to get this all put together by fashioning a new cross and adapting the one that is out front. The chimers have begun to practice, and I thought it was a great start. When their hour of practice was up the kids couldn't believe it was an hour and asked, "Can we play it one more time?" That means there is great potential here. Seedlings and sprouts have are meeting 2 times each a month and seem to be settling into place. Additionally, with Lent on First Communion classes. We will have First Communion on Maundy Thursday. There are several who are expressing interest but can't attend as scheduled so a second set of classes will be offered after Easter. We have 5 shut-in members at Hansen House in Harlan and a 6th over at Elm Crest. I am in the process of setting a date that each month, hopefully about 6 to 8 members will make small pot luck dishes and gather on a set day of each month at Hansen House, picking up the person from Elm Crest. We will meet for an hour and a half to share a "home cooked" meal, fellowship, and worship with communion which will insure that they all get communion monthly and get some fellowship with members here. There are three baptisms being scheduled for April and into spring. Schroeders and Taylor Madden's children.

President's Report/Comments: No report

Director of Ministry in Daily Life Report: Will be working on trying to gather and update 'grade' information for the youth in the congregation. Youth group will meet again March 12th & March 19th for Bible Study.

Council Reports

Property Report: The basketball hoop has been brought back to life and reinstalled. TC Roofing sealed the glass cross on the west end of the church. We had no leaks during our thunderstorm/blizzard event. They also patched holes in the rubber roof on the south side of the church to seal it up until they can come back and replace the roof completely. I have attached two lighting estimates. One is from ROI Energy on what a Mid American relight program would cost that includes interior & exterior lighting. The other estimate is from Errin Gunderson on what it would cost to do the exterior lighting project on the north and east sides. The west and south sides that were drawn on the Echo proposal need to be revisited. I will explain in more detail at the meeting

Worship: The Worship committee has continued to refine the process of selecting volunteers for the two services. We are continuing to add new volunteers, of which, youth readers from 3rd-6th grade will be coming soon. The sanctuary has been decorated for the Lenten season. Among the decorations, a new cross has been built and placed by the pulpit specifically for the "Journey of Stones" Lenten season.

Outreach: The month of February was a focus on our young adults. There are 25 young adults in our church family who are pursuing further education in preparation for a career in the future. There were 23 young adults who agreed to receive a "Mid-Term Hug" (care package) from a congregation member. All 23 care packages were returned in time to be mailed to our recipients. Each box had a gender based devotional that focused on topics related to tough decisions to be made as a young adult. Recipients were given the opportunity to send a selfie or a picture of their box to Sue with a little "thank you". As the "thank you's" arrive they will be shared in the monthly newsletter as well as the power point at the beginning of church services. This year, congregation members who packed a box were given the option to send an individual note in hopes to build a lasting relationship. Hoping to broaden this young adult ministry to be year round rather than one time a year. I'm pondering ways to form lasting relationships with the older adults with the youth. Details have yet to be determined.

Stewardship: We are trying to put together a "giving challenge" between 1st and 2nd service. We want to concentrate on the food pantry, and make sure they are stocked up on essential products/needs. We were hoping to create a point system for needed items listed in the newsletter and have the two services compete to collect the most points. Monetary donations would also be acceptable and given a point status. I want to make up some cards to hand out with bulletins that include the items and how many points they are worth. I would like to find a place to set up separate collection boxes for each service to track which service donated what. I was hoping to encourage the services with an incentive for the winning service. Any suggestions for incentives?

Convocation August 4th-8th, looking for a couple church members and one confirmed youth member.

New Business:

Shela Jacobsen reported on the need for upgraded computers due to outgoing software and we are not able to upgrade. Will need to replace 2 computers in the office, Pastor Matts and one in the Sanctuary. Proposal shared with computer upgrade and accessories. Motion made by Darian Irlbeck, second by Eric Sieh. Motion passed. Motion to amend made by Megan Hansen to support whatever additional accessories needed upon review. Seconded by Eric Sieh. Motion passed.

Council retreat - members are to send Pastor Matt their available Saturdays in May, June and July.

Easter Services - Maundy Thursday service will be at 6:30pm, Good Friday service will be at 6:30 pm. There will also be a 3 hour service from 12pm-3pm, with 20 min services for people to come and go on Good Friday. Easter services will be at 7 am and 9:30 am.

Discussion was held regarding what services will look like for Fall 2025. Council will continue to discuss options and where we want the congregation to grow.

Visioning: Discussion was held over chapters 1 of the book Junk Drawer Jesus.

Adjournment: Eric Sieh made a motion to adjourn the meeting, 2nd by Ryan Winter. Motion passed.

Next meeting will be held on April 10, 2025 at 7pm.


A memorable service for all!
